

Memorial Hospital of Carbon County recently held a celebration in honor of 100 years of patient care in Carbon County. The "100 Year Anniversary Employee Appreciation" event took place on October 29th in Rawlins.

Employees, board members, and guests enjoyed an evening of food and entertainment. Staff achieving the 5, 10, 15, 20, and 25 year milestones were recognized for their service.

Dr. Duane Abels was awarded with the Lifetime Achievement Award for his commitment to the organization after dedicating his career to MHCC.

The first annual DAISY Award Ceremony was also held in conjunction with the event and all DAISY nominees were recognized. Brenda Eaton, RN, was named as the 2021 DAISY Award winner. Special guest speaker Paul Borrillo completed the evening with a motivational message and entertainment.

A time capsule containing a variety of items from each department and clinic will be buried in the spring.

Memorial Hospital of Carbon County was first constructed in 1921 as a result of the Spanish Flu Pandemic. Prior to the establishment of the first official hospital in Carbon County, medical care was provided by several local practitioners in homes and community buildings, including Lillian Heath, the first woman doctor in Wyoming. The existing hospital was established in

1972 and has continued to expand with multiple additions to the facility as well as an emphasis on services and providers across Carbon County.
